Community (noun):

- 1. a group of people living in the same place or having a particular characteristic in common.
- 2. a feeling of fellowship with others, as a result of sharing common attitudes, interests, and goals.

There are four components to this assignment:

Part 1: Become a Reader!
Part 2: Identity Project
Part 3: Community Impact writing assignment
Part 4: Community Map



Part 1: Become a Reader

You may be wondering, how does one become a reader? Part of becoming a reader is discovering what you like to read! You want to find topics/genres you truly enjoy, and find the time that works best for you to focus on your reading. This might be in the morning, at night, for a break, at the beach, etc. You will be asked to read for 1.5 hours a week. I recommend you break that up into chunks of 15-20 minutes per day. You will then <u>record your time and progress in the weekly reading log below!</u>

Part 2: Identity Drawing

For this assignment you will create a caricature drawing to express your identity, so that your 8th grade teachers can get to know you! We will reflect on this project at the end of your 8th grade year to see how much you have changed over the course of the school year.

Part 3: Community Impact Writing Assignment

For this assignment, write about the protagonist (main character) from the book you chose to read for your reading log. If you read more than one book, pick your favorite to focus on for this assignment. In two well developed paragraphs (5-8 sentences each), discuss how the protagonist/main character of the book fits into the communities around them. **See the rubric & graphic organizer below!**



You will turn these assignments in *electronically* when you join the ELA Google Classroom in the fall! For now, keep it saved in your school google drive.

Part 4: Community Map Poster

As an 8th grade student, you are already a member of several different yet interconnected communities. For this project, you will "map" a minimum of eight communities you are a part of in an artistic way. Communities will range from the tight knit community of family, all the way up to the global community of our planet. Some layers may be the same for all students (school community), while others will be different (home towns). You may even choose to include communities that are important to you specifically (sports teams or clubs). There are many ways to express this map, and many communities to choose from so be creative!

<u>Directions</u>: Your final community map should be *bigger* than a standard piece of paper, and must include the following:

- 8 layers/communities you are a part of, with your name at the center or start of the map.
 - Community name prominently featured
 - A minimum of three (3) aspects of that community (names, phrases, quotes, important things that connect you to that layer), and one (1) drawing or image to represent that community.
 - Make it COLORFUL!!!!

Use the brainstorm organizer and community map examples at the end of this doc to help you plan your project.
